### The Book of Job, Part 1

**Suffering.** At some time in life, everyone experiences suffering. Suffering can be physical, mental, or spiritual. Any kind of suffering can be one of the most difficult and testing times of our life. Often we have many questions about suffering. Why must we suffer? Did I do something to deserve it? Why doesn't God stop it? To discuss some of these questions, we will study part of the book of Job in the Bible. We will divide the book into three studies.

- 1. Losing Everything.
- 2. Why?
- 3. God's Answer.

### Job: When Everything Was Good

Job had a very good life. Read Job 1:1-5, then fill in the blanks below.

### The Book of Job, Part 2

Why do we suffer? This is a difficult question to answer. Often, there is no clear answer. But any time we suffer, we usually ask "Why?" Job and his friends also asked why. In this study, we will two major responses to suffering; depression and looking for answers. We will see the dangers in both responses and look for the way God wants us to respond.

### The first response: Depression

At first, Job kept faith in God, he did not sin, he did not accuse God of doing wrong. Job still trusted God with his life. But as time went on and Job continued to suffer, what happened? Read Job 3:1. What did Job wish?

Does that mean Job lost his faith?

Read Job 3:20-26. Even though Job wants to die, what is one thing he doesn't do or suggest? (Remember Job 2:9.)

Even during his worst depression, does Job still have hope? Read Job 19:23-27.

### The second response: Blame

Job's three friends take turns telling Job basically the same thing. Read Job 4:7-9. What does Eliphaz say happens to innocent people? What happens to evil people?

What does that mean about Job? Why does Eliphaz think Job is suffering?

Read Job 4:17-19, 5:8, 17-19. Eliphaz clearly understands that we are sinful. What does Eliphaz think Job should do?

Read Job 8:3-7. Bildad's statement is a good summary of what the three friends believe. According to their beliefs, if you lived right and followed God, what will God do for you?

Is it true that if something bad happens to you, it happened because you did some sin? Read Luke 13:1-5.

Read Luke 9:23-24. If you follow Jesus, what kind of life does He say you will have?

Read Job 31:1-6, 35-37. After Job's friends are done speaking, after they tell Job he must have sinned and deserved God's punishment, what does Job answer? Where is Job's hope and trust?

Do you think Job could have said something better? What?

Why did God give so much back to Job?

### The Book of Job, Part 3

When we suffer, how do we get help? This is what we most want to know. Where is the help? When will the pain end? Why must I suffer? In the first study, we saw Job suffer, but continue confident in strong faith. In the second study, Job began to question God and struggle with why he must suffer. Now in the last study, we see God's answer to Job.

### Elihu Speaks

When Job began suffering, 3 friends came and tried to help. But they didn't speak God's word right and only made Job angry. Now a fourth man, Elihu, speaks. Read Job 33:14-15, 19-20, 23-24 (p. 628). He says God warns people 3 different ways. What are they?

1. God speaks in a \_\_\_\_\_ or \_\_\_\_\_.

Read Job 38:1-7 (634). Through all of chapters 38 and 39, God talks about how much He takes care of the world. When Job was accusing and questioning God, did Job really know what he was talking about?

How does Job answer God now? Job 40:1-5 (638).

Does Job's answer give you an idea how Job sinned against God? Hint: Job was concerned about his right actions (Job 33:8-10), but God was concerned about righteousness. Is there any difference between right actions and righteousness?
